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
**Ramblings of An
Eternal Optimist**

Lead. Loon. Not the usual sort of words that get an entire subset of anglers all fired up. What is it about those two four-letter words that galvanized national fishing equipment manufacturing organizations into intensely urging the Washington Fish & Wildlife Commission to reject a proposed fishing regulation? Especially when that regulation only affects 13 lakes, and was proposed and supported by WDFW staff.

The proposal: Ban certain types of lead sinkers and lead jigs on 13 Washington lakes where loons breed. The proponents argue that lead kills loons. The opponents say the research is flawed and loons eat fish, not stuff off the bottom. The debate on this specific proposal misses the mark. I note that no one can logically or scientifically argue that lead is good. Unleaded gas. Unleaded paint. Unleaded shotgun shells. "Nuff said.

I raise the point because I see the proposal as well as the one dealing with unclassified marine fish and invertebrates as a glimmer of hope that within WDFW, conservation and stewardship of natural resources may gain a foothold. That to some tiny degree, the concept of "you don't know what you've got 'til its' gone" is fading. As one WDFW manager stated, "this [proposal] represents a paradigm shift within the Department towards conservation." If you favor or oppose the paradigm shift, make your voice heard where it will make a difference. Contact the Department. (www.wdfw.wa.gov) Volunteer for an advisory board. Be proactive now.

Conservation Report

OLYMPIA - The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) will begin accepting grant applications Dec. 1 from individuals and groups seeking financial support for volunteer projects that benefit fish and wildlife. The one-year grants will support project activity occurring between July 1, 2010 and June 30, 2011.

Offered through the Aquatic Lands Enhancement Account (ALEA) Volunteer Cooperative Grant Program, the grants provide cost reimbursement for volunteer-driven projects that protect and enhance fish and wildlife, and their habitats, improve access to the outdoors, collect and disseminate fish and wildlife science, and educate the public about resource conservation. Project types include habitat restoration, research, education and outreach, facility development and artificial production. Other projects may be considered.

"We're interested in receiving proposals that utilize volunteers, reflect WDFW's goals and objectives and request funds to cover essential costs needed to conduct the project," said Josh Nicholas, program coordinator. Eligible applicants include individual citizens, non-profit organizations, state organizations such as public utility districts and schools (including universities), and tribal governments. Total funding available is approximately \$180,000.

Applications must be received by Feb. 28, 2010. Application materials are available on

More money in the conservation pot can be found by contacting one of the Regional Fisheries Enhancement Groups located throughout the state. These legislatively created program was created in 1990 for the purpose of gaining citizen involvement in the recovery and enhancement of salmon and steelhead and their habitats. Each of the 14 groups works in a specific geographic area defined by watershed boundaries, has its own board of directors, dictates its own priorities and directs its own projects. According to WDFW statistics from 1995 through 2008, the RFEG's have opened up 700 miles of spawning habitat by removing fish-passage barriers, repairing culverts and contributed more than 950,000 volunteer fish restoration hours. And there's more sources of conservation funds. For example, the Recreation and Conservation Office "creates and maintains opportunities for recreation, protects the best of the state's wild lands, and contributes to the state's efforts to recover salmon from the brink of extinction." It oversees five boards including the Salmon Recovery Funding Board. Lest you think this is small potatoes, in Fiscal Year 2009, the Salmon Recovery Funding Board awarded \$42.8 million in grants to protect and restore salmon populations. The awards covered ten counties across the state.

Conservation in action—Methow Valley Fly Fishers Little Twin Lake Solar Aerator

In 2006, MVFF was awarded a \$12,000 WDFW grant for installation of a shore powered aerator at Big Twin Lake. We were successful in raising \$5,000 from various WA fly clubs. These funds plus local contributions enabled us to complete the \$20,000 project. The carryover at Big Twin was most successful due to the effectiveness of the aerator system. Many WA clubs enjoyed some excellent fishing this year. This January, we will consider applying for a new grant. The grant request will be approximately \$20,000 for installation of a solar powered aerator on Little Twin Lake.

MVFF will be seeking some \$8,000 in contributions. We still have to apply for the grant but would like to know of other club support.

**Fly Fishing Fair April
30-May 1, 2010**

In what has rapidly become known as the best fly fishing show, your Washington Council is again bringing you a 2-day fly tying, fly casting, rod demonstration, fishing class, seminar, raffle, auction and Saturday night dinner/live auction extravaganza. Yep, all that in just two days April 30-May 1, 2010.

Fly Tying Co-Chairs Vicki Hoagland and Dan Ferguson are lining up 125 of the best and most diverse fly tiers that will demonstrate patterns for Alaska freshwater to Baja California saltwater, from Olympic Peninsula steelhead to Banks Lake carp and most every place and species in between. Come see Skip Morris demonstrate some of his pet patterns and learn how he makes the fish bite. Sit across the table from Steve Brocco or Harry Lemire—both members of the Washington Fly Tying Hall of Fame. Watch John Newbury or Bruce Staples—both Buszek Award winners—tie their pet patterns. If so, Vicki Eagle Elk will teach your fingers what to do. Is dubbing a mystery? Michael T. Williams' class “Dubbing Demystified” is just for you. Did you score a new spey rod for Christmas and need to learn how to cast? Aaron Reimer teaches Spey

Casting on the Yakima River. Red's Fly Shop is again teaching the Drift Boat Handling and Safety Class both Friday and Saturday.

Free. That's the price of all seminars at the Fly Fishing Fair. Last year's were so successful that we're doubling the number and adding new topics. Seminars will cover were to go, when to go, what to use and more. We expect to have most of the presenters back from last year and have added more topics and more speakers.

Tom Schreier taught lake fishing and will add an entomology presentation this year. Preston Singletary will do a Bull Trout presentation. 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Fly of the Season

Pink Worm. It's a beaut, ain't it? Can't you just see it bobbing along downstream, just a few inches above the rock and cobble, drifting, undulating and twitching seductively towards the awaiting mouth of a mighty steelhead?

Fie on tradition. Swinging unweighted flies like the Purple Peril or Green Butt Skunk is just so 20th Century or so it would seem if the modern steelheader's fly box were closely examined. Or maybe not.

Could it be argued that the pink worm, rubber-leg stonefly nymph and mini-jig are actually a return to tradition? After all, steelhead are trout and trout eat worms and bugs—foods traditionally imitated by fly tossers.

Why feature the pink worm? Well,

there are two reasons. First, the guy who said he would send me samples of his new killer steelhead fly didn't. Second, I attended an all-day seminar sponsored by Steelhead U. (attendance was assuredly solely in the interest of science.) Every speaker stressed the importance of the pink worm in catching steelhead. I don't fish steelhead, preferring the more egalitarian species such as bluegill, smallmouth and carp, but have friends who insist on standing in cold water, making repeated casts, day after day in hopes for a "grab." And I feel it is my duty as a friend to a) not make fun of them, and b) do what I can to increase whatever miniscule chance they might have of accomplishing a "grab." Hence, featuring the pink worm.

However, please note that in keeping with past Fly of the Season col-

umns, no tying instructions are included. Nor are any how, where or when to fish tips mentioned. For such information, the steelheader will need investigate on his or her own. After all, tradition in fly fishing and column-writing must be observed.



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
