Back to Kaufmann's, sign me up! Until then, the only fishing experience I had was at age 5 when I caught a goldfish using a rice paper net at an Okinawan festival before the paper disintegrated in the water. In 1995, after weeks of decorating the trees of the Middle Fork of the Snoqualmie with all my flies, Mike Kinney, who worked at the Swallow's Nest, easily convinced me to take a fly tying class. I've since demo-tied and taught fly tying at numerous events.



Fly of the Season

Get ready for summer beach fishing with the one fly that makes tricking sea-run cutthroat, resident and ocean silvers, and yes, even the occasional Chinook all the more fun. For those who've never had the pleasure fishing the Miyawaki Beach Popper (MBP for short), you are missing a thrill. Here's a sug-Instead of fighting the gestion. Yakima River inner tube hatch this summer, heed the words of Horace Greeley and Go West. Yes, head to the 1,800 miles of beach in Puget Sound. Head to the Olympic Peninsula. Head to Neah Bay. Just make sure you take a floating line, a long (12-14 feet) leader and a pocket full of Poppers.

The MBP was developed by Leland Miyawaki, the Bellevue Orvis Store

Fishing Manager, over years of beach fishing adventure and exploration. More a glider than a popper because the foam head is turned with the convex face towards the hook, eye, the pattern comes in to color variations. The original is olive green over white, with a bit of flash, a few strands of peacock herl topping and an upright stinger hook. The new design is pink over

white. Both are effective and not surprisingly, all materials or ready-made flies are available at Orvis-Bellevue.

The pattern imitates any number of baitfish that silvers and sea-runs chomp. Fish it like a baitfish, or even better like an injured baitfish to trigger strikes. Make sure to delay the strike for a moment to allow the fish to actually close on the fly.

Your editor also likes this pattern for smallmouth bass in late summer when the water's warm (a use that Leland considers blasphemy).

Leland, not known for stretching either the size or numbers of fish caught, loves to tell about the thirteen sea-runs taken on thirteen consecutive casts from a South Sound beach. Come to think of it, that likely happened on Friday, the 13th.
